RESEARCH NEWS

BEHAVIOURAL/ECOLOGICAL studies of some passerines were started this year at Algonquin Provincial Park and at Short Hills Park near St. Catherines by Richard Knapton of Brock University, and Ed Basalyga, Laurianne Carlson, Cecily Fleming and Joanne Siderius. Eastern Meadowlarks were investigated to determine criteria used by females in choosing mates and to assess the contribution by the male to young of primary, secondary and tertiary females. Hermit Thrushes were looked at to determine song organization and repertoire in relation to territory size and nesting success. Nashville Warblers were studied to determine the contribution by the male to raising young in a monomorphic, monagamous passerine. This work will continue in 1983 and beyond to assess long term trends, especially the influence of age (R.W. Knapton).

BEHAVIOURAL/ECOLOGICAL studies of colonial nesting seabirds continued this summer at colony locations near Port Colborne, Ontario. The field team included Ralph Morris, David Wiggins and Miriam Richards of Brock, Virginia Wai-Ping of York and John Chardine of Durham. Three observation blinds were used in the Common Tern and Herring Gull colonies to obtain information on courtship feeding rates by males and on incubation and chick feeding effort by partners in marked pairs. Habitat selection behaviour of late-nesting Common Terns was assessed by the use of experimentally produced substrate types (R.D. Morris).

BEHAVIOURAL/ECOLOGICAL studies of Cowbird breeding systems, female territoriality in Red-winged Blackbirds, parental investment patterns in Swallows and Warblers and morphological differences among individuals in different Red-winged Blackbird populations are currently being carried out by Raleigh Robertson and his students at Queen's University (K. Teather).

MEETINGS

BALD EAGLE DAYS 1983. All those who are interested are invited to attend Bald Eagle Days 1983 to be held in Winnipeg 18-21 Aug. 1983. This annual meeting is a forum for research on the Bald Eagle, and is sponsored by the Eagle Valley Environmentalists. Activities include a field trip to the Lake of the Woods, workshops, paper sessions (including information on capture and sexing techniques, acid rain and forestry practices) and a banquet. Although the major interest is the Bald Eagle, Canadian raptor enthusiasts with interests in other species may participate in a working session if there is a demand for such. These are essentially volunteer positions, but living expenses and accommodation are provided at the observatory. Assistants help with the Migration Monitoring Program (banding and censusing of migrants) and associated record keeping. During the May-July period there is also work involved with ongoing studies of Tree Swallows at three nest box colonies. In addition, Assistants help with maintenance of buildings and equipment, analyze data and take part in "atlas" fieldwork. REQUESTS FOR ASSISTANCE

BANDERS OF GULL, TERN, HERON, AND CORMORANT chicks are requested to send their yearly totals of chicks banded, past and present, by species and general location, and details of any deformities observed to Glen A. Fox, Wildlife Toxicology Division, Canadian Wildlife Service, National Wildlife Research Centre, Ottawa, Ontario, KlA 0E7, for use in environmental epidemiological investigations.

BURROWING OWLS were color-marked in 1982, in south-central Saskatchewan during a research program investigating movements of these owls in the breeding season. Information is requested from anyone seeing a color-marked owl, to aid in determining migration routes and wintering areas, which are presently unknown. Each owl carries a Fish and Wildlife band and 1-3 colored plastic leg jesses. Jess colors are yellow, flourescent red, light blue, and dark green. Observers are asked to record: location, date, color and position of jess(es), leg of attachment of metal band and jess(es), and any details of the owl's situation. THE JAMES L. BAILLIE MEMORIAL FUND for Bird Research and Preservation invites applications for grants to support projects on Ontario birds in 1983. The Fund's aim is to encourage field studies by amateur naturalists and to support projects which increase or disseminate knowledge of birds in their natural environment or contribute to their preservation. Priority will be given to projects which draw on the resources of volunteer naturalists in conducting research or fieldwork and to applicants who do not have access to other sources of support.
